


Glenview farm each weekend.

The well known explorer, William Landsborough took up land near present day Golden Beach, between that of Samuel Leach and Robert Bulcock's lands. Landsborough ran sheep on Loch Lamerough for a time and John Maltman of Glenview was the Overseer. Two Maltman's sons worked for Landsborough, Bob (James Robert aged 7 yrs.) and Alex (9 yrs.), were shepherds. The boys walked from his Loch Lamerough at Golden Beach, to their parents' Glenview farm each weekend.




John William MALTMAN, 1876-1958




John William Maltman (1876-158) pictured on horse-back (right) on the Landsborough-Maleny Road travelling up the range towards Maleny, where he had a dairy farm and kept his bullock team. John used his bullock team to cart butter from the Maleny Buter Factory to Landsborough for the Maleny Dairy Co-operative Association Ltd.



Picture taken from the front of the Maleny Hotel looking west. John William Maltman (1876-158) pictured far right. Buildings in background include the first Co-operative store, the first Butter factory, the second Cooperative store and Tytherleigh's store. John Maltman was one of several local residents who, between 1905-1912 secured the contract to cart butter from the Maleny Butter Factory to the rail head at Landsborough. The first contractors to undertake the job were F. J. Vandrieke assisted by L. Tesch. They were followed by Tom Brown and Jim Douglas and then as butter production increased, bullock teams were introduced for the work by J. Grigor and W. Maltman until October 1912.








Mr Bob Maltman built a privately owned hall on the corner Maltman & Queen Streets, where Church services, dances, meetings and movies were held.

The Cafe was used during WWII as a canteen for some of the Aust Army battalions that were camped about Currimundi, Dicky Beach and Caloundra areas.






WHEN the Maltman family decides to head to the beach for the day, the chances are they're not planning on lazing in the sun.

Three generations of the family are now involved in patrolling the shoreline - a tradition which has its roots almost 30 years ago.

Life members Ivan Maltman and his son Cleveland joined Marcoola Surf Life Saving Club in 1983. Cleveland's brother, Lachlan soon joined and now his niece Holly, 16, has signed up to continue the tradition.

"This is the first time that Marcoola has had three generations as lifesavers all as current active bronze holders," Cleveland said.

"We love the beach and the lifestyle and hopefully our kids and their kids will continue on through the club."

An electrician by trade, Cleveland said his family traced its Sunshine Coast links back to 1875.

"My dad was born here in Caloundra and our family has been here for many years," he said.

Although the three generations may vary in age, their love of the beach and serving the community are common bonds.

"We don't normally patrol all at the same time. We have in the past but not of late," Cleveland said.

"That being said, my father did purposely roster himself on the same patrol as Holly. I think he wanted that grandfather/granddaughter team.

"The Sunshine Coast is such a great place to live and work. If you're going to make a life anywhere why not here?"
